

## ABRONIA UMBELLATA.

The Abronias are beautiful trailing plants introduced from California. The prostrate branches bear clusters of sweet-scented rosyliac flowers with white centers, somewhat like the Verbena. Although perennial, they bloom the first year. The seeds should be started under glass, first removing the husky covering. Packet, 4 ets.

# DIRECTIONS FOR PLANTING FLOWER SEEDS.

Small flower seeds are started most easily in small boxes about three inches in depth. Fill with earth to within one-half inch of the top and smooth the surface. Scatter the seeds evenly over the surface and, using a sieve, cover lightly with fine soil, just about as deep as the thickness of the seeds. You will see that

with some seeds this is practically no covering at all, which is the case.—You must follow this rule carefully. After covering, sprinkle with a very fine sprinkler not to uncover the seeds and keep in a temperature of 60 or 70 degrees. Cover the box with a glass to keep in the moisture, and watch carefully not to let it get dry.

When large enough to handle, transplant into the open ground. The larger seeds may be proportionately deeper, and one-fourth to one-third inch of cover will do no harm. Sweet peas do best when planted quite deeply, even four or five inches being an advantage and preferable to shallow planting.

## ADONIS AUTUMNALIS

(Pheasant's Eye).

This is a very handsome herbaceous annual with finely cut, rich, dark foliage. Its bright blood red flowers gave rise to the classical story that it sprang from the blood of Adonis. It should be sown in autumn, or in February or March in the house, as the plants are a long time in coming up. Packet, 4 cts.

## AGERATUM.

A very valuable and showy plant, of neat, erect, bushy habit, used especially for borders. It produces profusely throughout the season curiously shaped blue or white flowers. It will do better if clipped back. Seeds sown in autumn will produce plants for winter blooming. Perennial, blooming the first season from seed.

#### AMARANTHUS.

Caudatus (Love Lies Bleeding). Tall and graceful, with its long tassels of red, fringe-like flowers, growing to a height of from four to five feet, it is very desirable as a background, and succeeds well in almost any soil. It will be found especially pretty for decorating. Packet, 4 cts.




## ÁNCHUSA CAPENSIS.



(Swan River Daisy).



## BUTTERFLY FLOWER (Schizanthus).






## COCCINEA INDICA.

## CYCLAMEN PERSICUM.

A genus of bulbous-rooted plants, with beautiful foliage and fragrant, orchidlike, exquisite flowers, universal favorites for winter and spring blooming. There are few handsomer plants than the Cyclamen. The heart-shaped foliage is beautifully shaded and marked, and the charming flowers borne on long footstalks above the crown of foliage, show exquisite shades of white, crimson, blush and pink, most flowers showing two colors. A good specimen will have from twenty-five to fifty flowers in full bloom at one time, and the plants remain in bloom for months together. The seed should be sown in the early spring in a sandy loam. ## DOUBLE DAISY (Bellis Perennis).




